With the support of her spouse and their extended family within the Indian community, she became involved in the fledging multi-cultural group, eventually serving as Program Director for 10 years.

Bea continues to play an active role in the Multicultural Council from which she laughingly claims she isn't "allowed" to retire. She believes that the annual Fair, now in its 32nd year, has created better communication among

Since September, 2012, 14 students from Zhengzhou No. 9 High School have come to their second home, Brockville, and stayed with local host families. Here their study journey began.

All the teenagers have been facing varieties of challenges, such as language barrier, cultural shock, homesickness, etc., but if you ask any one of them about their experience in Brockville,

here are the answers:

"It is so beautiful, I like the blue sky and river, clean air"

"People are so friendly and helpful!

"Hosts are so kind and caring, just like our parents!"

"Teachers and classmates are nice and helpful!"

"I love the YMCA!"

In the last 7 months, the students had the experience celebrating Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter holidays with their hosts and tasted the charm of a different culture, and also celebrated Moon festival and Chinese New year with the help of UCLC and Education Bridge International to relieve their homesickness.

When you ask if there is

anything they hope will happen during their adventure in Brockville, you will hear their voices:

"I hope there will be more activities and events we could participate in"

"I hope school could have events for both us and local students since we would like to make more friends."

Overall, the experience of the students is positive. With the promotion from Education Bridge International, more and more parents and students know about Brockville and its hometown charm, and would like to send their children to Brockville as their study destination in Canada."

Out of respect for the poet, the Chinese people throw dumplings into the river to scare away the fish so they will not feed on the poet's body.

TR Leger Immigrant Services

TR Leger Immigrant Services provides free settlement services to permanent residents, live-in caregivers and convention refugees. It is funded by Citizenship and Immigration Canada and administered by TR Leger School, part of the Upper Canada District School Board. Julie Case is a settlement worker in this area. She is available to help newcomers with the many issues of becoming established in their communities including:

- help with government forms, applications for citizenship, child tax credit, PR card renewals etc.
- registering children in schools
- finding employment counselling or credential assessment;
- learning about volunteer, social and recreational opportunities
- referring clients to free TR Leger ESL classes to improve their English skills (see below).



Julie will meet you privately for assistance with these or other matters. Settlement workers there can be reached toll free at 1-877-412-2472.

Adult English as a Second Language classes began at TR Leger School of Adult, Alternative and Continuing Education on Tuesday, September 3. Classes are free for students who are permanent residents, citizens, live-in caregivers, or convention refugees, who were born outside of Canada and whose first language is not English or French. Classes are also available to other students on a fee for service basis. Classes are offered Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 9:00 am to 3:30 pm.

In the English classes students study in small groups and individually, progressing at their own level and speed. They work on the four language skills: speaking, listening, reading, and writing in many different ways, keeping a portfolio of their work and progress. Individual goals may be established with the instructor. Immigration Statistics

According to the latest Census Canada data, immigrant arrivals in Leeds Grenville have doubled since 2001 compared to the previous 10 year period. Brockville, Leeds and the 1000 Islands and North Grenville are three main centres for immigration activity. New Canadians represent 7% of the Leeds Grenville population. Brockville has the highest number of immigrant arrivals at 8%.

The largest proportion of Leeds Grenville immigrants are between 25 and 44 years of age. This age group is one of the smaller proportions in the non-immigrant population. The smallest proportion of immigrants is older than 44, whereas this is the largest proportion of non-immigrants.

The top three source regions for Leeds Grenville immigrants are Europe, the Americas and Asia. Africa and Oceania/other, contribute the remaining numbers. Compared to Leeds Grenville, Brockville has a slightly lower proportion of immigrants from European countries and almost double the proportion of individuals from Asia.

Local Business Celebrates Success

Eagle Point Winery in Mallorytown celebrated the export of its first container of wines to Wuhai, Inner Mongolia, China in August 2013. This initial shipment of 1000 cases of wine signifies the culmination of years of incubating relationships which were started in 2008 when Mayor Frank Kinsella and past Councillor Tom Lawler of the Township of Leeds and the 1000 Islands, travelled to China in hopes of stimulating interest among the Chinese in investment in the 1000 Islands.

As a result of the Township trade expeditions of 2008 and 2010, interest was sparked and current Eagle Point Winery Owner, Zhongyi Du, travelled to the 1000 Islands in the fall of 2011. Having fallen in love with the area, Mr. Du purchased the waterfront estate as well as the Eagle Point Winery, vineyard and farm in April of 2012.

The multimillion dollar investment by the Chinese industrialist has resulted in positive changes at Eagle Point Winery and Estate. Six new jobs have been created, as well as the acquisition of new grape and wine processing equipment including 50 new premium French oak barrels.

"All over Eastern Ontario we suffer the loss of our youth, but with the recent investment into our winery we have been able to offer career opportunities to two young women, recent graduates from Post-Secondary Education, allowing them to remain where they grew up" stated Debra Marshall, Operations Manager. "We have received a great response from our local community as well as from representatives of the Chinese Government."


The "tour guides", pointed out dozens of places of interest, explained the nature of the business/agency, and answered a barrage of questions.

They are committed to helping individuals reach their potential through education, employment, volunteering and financial counselling.

"Many people come to the EEC because they are not really sure what their next life step should be," notes Sue Watts, the Assistant Director. "We work hard to help people figure out what their next move should be, whether it's a job, going to school, volunteering or getting their finances in order."

"In addition to helping people of all ages find jobs and access training and retraining opportunities, the EEC also offers several unique programs and initiatives which are not provided by any other organization in our area."



Parents and Grandparents Program

Canadian citizens and permanent residents wishing to sponsor foreign parents or grandparents under a special immigration program can do so beginning January 2, 2014. The federal government is reopening the door by accepting 5,000 sponsorship applications under the new Parent and Grandparent Program. The government froze applications in 2011 to deal with the massive backlog of wait times of eight years.

The sponsor of relatives hoping to immigrate to Canada must now meet new criteria to be eligible to apply including:

- Meeting an increase of 30 per cent in the minimum necessary income for sponsoring relatives. For instance, a family of three will now require a minimum income of \$45,039 to sponsor a relative, instead of \$34,646
- Showing they meet the new minimum income threshold for the last three years, as opposed to 12 months
- Sponsoring the parents and grandparents for a period of 20 years, a rise from 10 years

Parents and grandparents can also apply to visit their relatives in Canada up to two years at a time through a "Super Visa," now a permanent government program.
